I've recently joined the amazing team at Marsh Lake Community Centre as the Recreation Programmer. This is an exciting opportunity for me! And I've been asked to share a bit about myself, as we'll likely be meeting at some point.

During my childhood, my Dad worked for BC Hydro. As a family we saw some of the most beautiful and remote areas of the province, spending many years in the fertile Columbia River Basin. From there the closest city was Vernon, 90 miles across the Monashee Pass, a one-lane, gravel road replete with switchbacks...somewhat reminiscent of the Alaska Highway a few years back! Though I learned early what it meant to "make your own fun", my parents' focus on community created the backdrop for a childhood rich with opportunity!

My early memories include community barn dances, my friends and I "helping" my dad clear our outdoor rink so he could flood it for the next day's skating, and Saturday nights at the local community hall, where my dad, with our neighbours, ran the projector, bringing Tarzan and other movies to the screen for the whole community. I recall summers spent at a nearby lake. Mom

taught all us kids to swim while other moms fed us at the wharf that the community got together to build.

When the Columbia River Basin was flooded to provide power to our southerly neighbours, changes came that no one predicted. As families moved to wherever they could start over, the sense of belonging-ness was lost for many, as were livelihoods. This loss resulted in the "Columbia Basin Trust" being forged nearly three decades later in an attempt to remedy some of the damage done to the communities that had existed along the river.

As a young adult, then at the University of British Columbia, perhaps it's no surprise that I was attracted to studying therapeutic recreation, and working in "communities within communities", with vulnerable children and youth. Throughout my work life, I've been fortunate enough to spend lengthy periods downhill and cross-country skiing, traveling, and, for some variety, working in more physically-oriented jobs like steel work, ski patrolling and treeplanting. Eventually I returned to the University of Victoria to complete a degree in social work, beginning a second career that has spanned several decades.

I met my best friend, Gerald, in 1980. We later married and our lovely kids, Rachel and Arion were born. We have our roots firmly in rural living, music and the outdoors and ultimately we've found that these are our passions. When we moved from the Kootenays to the Yukon in 1998, I continued in social work, working with adults experiencing a range of disabilities, until September of this year, when I retired from the Yukon Government. Last year we found our "dream" home here at Marsh Lake.

Now, when I stand out on our deck in New Constabulary and hear the coyotes howl, life feels so much like a circle. Gerald and I enjoy the friendships we're building here and we hope to spend lots of years as active members of this richly diverse community. I'm excited about my new role in supporting healthy recreational opportunities here in Marsh Lake and happy to call it our home...and our community.

Here To Stay

Between taking blood pressure readings at September's Wellness Clinic at the Rec. Centre, Cherie Van De Kraats shared some of her background and explained how she came to be the newly-hired Recreation Assistant for the Marsh Lake Community Society. When we started chatting, Cherie suggested she has led a "pretty boring life".

Well, I beg to differ. Cherie was born and spent her pre-Yukon years in and around Sudbury, Ontario. Growing up Cherie was involved in Sea Cadets. She was also a swimmer and had opportunities to travel around Ontario when she competed in biathlon events. It was there she met her husband Albert and where their two children, daughter Samantha (14) and son Mackenzie (12) were born. Cherie joked about starting her family at a relatively young age and because the kids were born fairly close together, they are sometimes referred to as "Irish Twins".

Though some might say that "Stay-at-home Mom" is not the most glamorous job title, in my view it's one of the most important careers a parent could ever hope to have. The hours are long and the pay's not the best, but the rewards go on and on. Cherie admitted she really has enjoyed being at home with her kids as they were growing up.

There always seems to be an interesting little side-bar when you ask someone not born and raised in Yukon how they ended up here - and even more importantly, at Marsh Lake. As so often happens, people come to Yukon for work and end up staying forever. The Van De Kraats family appears to be no exception. In 2005, Albert was looking for a transfer with his Company. Cherie told him she didn't really care where they moved but she wasn't going anywhere more northerly than Dryden, Ontario. When the Yukon opportunity came up, Cherie and Albert spent some intense hours trying to make their decision. Once they decided they were ready for the challenge, they had less than six weeks to find a place to live, pack up their lives, and head way further north than either of them ever imagined they would. Do they ever regret the move? Cherie told me of all the places she and Albert have lived, the Yukon is the "first place that's felt like home".

I asked Cherie why she applied for the Recreation Assistant's position. She said it's the perfect job for her right now. She has been wanting to get more involved in Community activities; the Centre is close to home, her kids are getting older and don't need her to be home with them all the time, and the hours are manageable.

In her spare time, Cherie is experimenting with flower arranging. She laughingly told me she had spent considerable time this past summer "trying to tame my yard". Any of us who have wrangled with wild rose bushes will completely understand the concept and offer her some measure of luck.

Besides darting around the Rec Centre like a woman on a mission (if you've ever seen Cherie in action during a Community event, you'll know what I'm talking about), Cherie is also very active as a Marsh Lake Emergency Medical Services volunteer. She trained three days a week for six weeks to get her Emergency Medical Dispatcher certification. She has also taken an intense three day course put on by the Emergency Medical Dispatch Association that is recognized world-wide and certifies her to work as a Police/Fire Dispatcher in any city that uses a "911" protocol. Cherie told me that, when she was growing up, her father had been a volunteer firefighter. The work he did had always fascinated her and when she and Albert moved to the Yukon, she took advantage of the opportunity to get involved.

Welcome Cherie to the Marsh Lake Community Society Team and a big thank you for your commitment to our beautiful community.

Marsh Lake Local Area Planning Underway

Saturday November 5, Plan Marsh Lake held an afternoon meeting to discuss a vision for the community plan. 20 Marsh Lake residents came out to share ideas about what the community might look like, or at least what we would like it to look like ten years down the road.

The afternoon was facilitated by Angela Walkley of Cambio Consulting who has the contract to develop and implement the planning process. Two members of the steering committee also attended the workshop: Georgia Greetham and Malcolm Taggart.

To date the planning team has been working on gathering information. This included a survey, kitchen table meetings and a field trip. All of the results are now available on-line. Go to planmarshlake.ca and follow the link to the publications and results.

The next step, and the reason that Marsh Lakers gathered on November 5th was to get some of the big picture perspective. What are elements of the community that we envision?

Here are some of the ideas that came forward through that workshop that got solid agreement from the folks that were participating:

- maintain our strong sense of community (e.g. our quiet neighbourhood feel)
- increase services in Marsh Lake to reduce our dependence on Whitehorse (e.g. local market, nurse practitioner, etc.)
- ensure that development reflects the range of people coming from a mixed social fabric (e.g. in income, interests, etc.)
- preserve the natural environment (e.g. wildlife corridors, bird habitat, etc.)

Angela and her team have also been working with Kwanlin Dün First Nation. The planning area is actually comprised of 48% Kwanlin Dün settlement lands. Yukon Government land makes up the next biggest chunk. There is a little over 6% of privately owned lands and also a small amount of Carcross Tagish First Nation settlement land.

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The Marsh Lake Local Area Plan will be approved by both the Yukon Government on non-settlement land and by the Kwanlin Dün First Nation on Settlement Land.. As Angela puts it “the plan should strive to be consistent with the interests of Kwanlin Dün, Yukon Government and Marsh Lake.”

The next step in the process will be another workshop some time this winter. From the information gathered and the visioning work, a plan will be drafted over the spring and summer.

ED SHIFFKORN MEMORIAL AWARD UNVEILED

The community of Marsh Lake was privileged to have Ed Shiffkorn as a volunteer with Marsh Lake Emergency Services. In 2000, Ed retired from his 25 year career as a firefighter and moved to Marsh Lake. Almost immediately he joined the Marsh Lake Fire Rescue volunteer fire department. Fire rescue and the ambulance service eventually combined and they are now known as Marsh Lake Emergency Services (MLES). Sadly, our dear friend and dedicated volunteer passed away last year. Ed is deeply missed by many.

We wish to honour his memory and the many things he brought to our Community. Ed was sincerely dedicated, truly committed, highly skilled as an Emergency Responder, a great mentor, and a leader in volunteer service. So, MLES created the *Ed Schiffkorn Memorial Award*. The plaque is inscribed: "2010 Thanks to all Emergency Responders for Heroic Actions and Special Deeds" and will be presented annually to an outstanding member of Marsh Lake Emergency Services.

Ed's wife, Betty shared the following, "Ed was proud to work with all of the volunteers of Emergency Services. The rest of the Community should also be proud of the department and the

dedicated individuals involved in helping keep people safe."

Blair Corley is the first recipient of this prestigious award. Blair is a Marsh Lake volunteer emergency services member involved in both fire rescue and Yukon rural ambulance teams. Blair is a very loyal, active and highly regarded MLES volunteer. He also demonstrates many of the awesome qualities, values and traits that Ed was known for. Blair was selected by his peers to receive this memorial award because of his outstanding contributions.

On behalf of the Marsh Lake Emergency Services crew, I would like to take to take this opportunity to personally congratulate Blair for being the 2011 recipient of the *Ed Shiffkorn Memorial Award* and tell you a little bit about him.

Blair grew up in Russell, Manitoba. He began working as a surveyor on large projects in the Prairies and then went to work in the potash mine at Esterhazy, Saskatchewan.

Blair and his wife Judy lived in Esterhazy for seven years before

moving with their two children to Clinton Creek in 1974. Mining was their bread and butter for most of their early lives. Blair

worked at Whitehorse Copper, Cassiar Asbestos in Cassiar, B.C., Anvil Range at Faro and also Ketz River Mines. Blair remembers how his family joked that whenever he went to work for a mine it was the death knell for the operation and it would soon close. Much like a small community, mining is an industry where people form very close ties. Blair still has close friends from his mining days.

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Blair started his fire service volunteering in Esterhazy, Saskatchewan in the 1960s and continued when he moved to Clinton Creek, Yukon in the 70's. It was at Clinton Creek that he started volunteering with EMS as well, mostly because his home was conveniently located across the street from the ambulance garage. Blair derives much satisfaction from being a part of something that is vital to a small community like Marsh Lake.

Blair's resume also boasts other fields of employment; realtor, park planning technician, city bus driver, and tour bus operator. He enjoys working with people and being part of a team. Blair is very honoured to be recognized by the Marsh Lake team and strongly encourages anyone who has been thinking about volunteering to get involved and be part of helping to keep the community, friends, and families safe.

Our fire hall seemed to be recruiting very young volunteers during a day that welcomed the community's youngest members to check out the equipment.

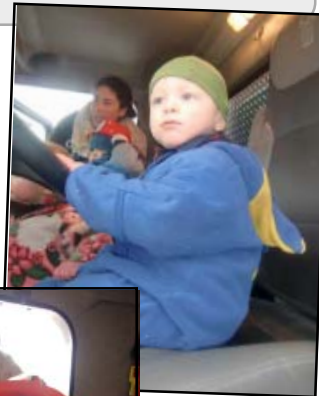
Marsh Lake Emergency Services is always looking for more people to get involved so we can continue to provide the best possible emergency services to our Community.
